

UPDATE FOLLOWING OUR "NEXT STEPS" PUDDING EVENING, LAST NOVEMBER.

At our wonderful 'Pudding Evening' last November we decided upon four priorities for our working together across the whole Benefice in areas of shared interest. These priority areas were very much a 'grass roots' decision by those present, and the four topic groups of our "Next steps" met immediately during that evening, to begin to plan a way ahead. The four identified areas are:

- 1. Formation of a <u>Benefice Choir</u>. Shirley Richmond has assumed leadership in this area. The Choir helped to lead worship at some of our Christmas Services, and are planning future such occasions for example in our <u>Maundy Thursday Service at Halwill</u>. More members are very welcome, so please get in touch with Shirley! No auditions required!
- 2. Formation of a <u>Schools Support Team</u> to help in various ways according to people's interests: Listening to younger children read, Running an 'Open the Book' Programme in which children work with team members to lead short drama vignettes in lessons and Assemblies, Offering to become School Governors, Assisting Stephen in School Assemblies. Stephen will be convening a meeting for those who are interested on the **evening of March 7TH**, **by Zoom**, so please get in touch if you are interested in this exciting work!
- 3.Running of <u>Benefice-wide Social events</u>, so we can have some fun together! Ideas in this area include: a Walking Group, Skittles &

Quiz Nights, Pub Get-togethers, Ladies Lunches, Men's Breakfasts. The range of possibilities is too wide for any one person to offer leadership, so we will be seeking leaders to organise specific events as the year progresses. Our next Social will be on **16**th **March, 7pm at the "Bickford Arms",** Brandis Corner, when we will have a buffet provided by the pub priced at £6 per head. Please see posters elsewhere.

4. Increasing the number of 'Café Churches' around our churches. Again, this requires a team to help run these around our churches, drawing on the experience we are gaining at the monthly 11am Black Torrington Services, and the bimonthly Clawton Services (with Methodist expertise). Ashwater have expressed interest in running these, but we are currently rather short of volunteers to run these with Stephen. We are running a special Benefice-wide Café Church at Black Torrington on 27th March, 6.30pm. We invite everyone who is interested to come and experience this wonderful, informal approach to worship for themselves. Thus inspired, we hope that more churches will run these – facilities permitting!

The Benefice Group are overseeing these exciting "Next Steps" – our way of fulfilling the suggestions made by the Exeter Diocese. But our greatest need is for more people to take on <u>Leadership</u> in one of these areas!! There are people who will help fulfil these objectives, but leadership needs to come from among YOU, not only by myself! I'm convinced that you have the energy and gifts needed, so please consider stepping out in faith and volunteering to take a lead! You'll get lots of 'back up'!

Reflection by Prebendary Jacqueline Taylor – Dean of Women in Ministry

You may have heard of the expedition that is taking place to the Weddell Sea in Antarctica to try and locate the wreck of Sir Ernest Shackleton's Ship – Endurance. She sailed from Millbay Dock Plymouth, in August 1914 and five months became trapped in pack ice in one of the most inhospitable places on Earth. A 144 foot long 25 foot wide speck – stuck in millions of square miles of ice. After months of pressure building from ice upon her hull, she had to be abandoned, the men now out on the ice. Finally her timbers crushed, she sank in November 1915.

I have a particular interest in this expedition to locate the ship because my great uncle was on board Endurance and indeed, along with the other members, endured the long months of raw survival until their rescue on 29th August 1917.

As Endurance left Plymouth, Lionel knew his destination. He was First Officer on a journey to take Shackleton and his men to undertake the land crossing of Antarctica. And yet he unexpectedly found himself in a very different type of wilderness to that of the terrain that Jesus encountered in his 40 days of testing and temptation that we mark in the season of Lent. Antarctica is both the coldest continent, -89°C recorded in 1983 and the driest, with an average annual snowfall of just 125mm.

As the search for Endurance takes place and we enter our Lenten journey with Ash Wednesday on 2nd March, I wonder where you think the journey of reflection, prayer and preparation that you are embarking on this year, is going to take you? What will you look to as a map or a chart to guide you and give you direction? What will you take with you to help you on your way, that you'll spend time looking at – reflecting on, reading or studying to help you make the most of the weeks of this precious Lenten journey. In this time when we invite God's Spirit to clear away the clutter, sweep away the dust and wash us clean. When we, his pilgrim people, are invited to prepare ourselves heart, soul, mind and body for the new beginnings – the life of Easter.

As he set out, did Lionel expect to be the same person at the end of his journey as he was when he set out, a young man of twenty five, full of the sense of adventure?

Do we expect that the person we are at the start of our Lenten journey and the person we are at the end of it will be the same or different? Are we open to say - I will learn from this journey whatever it may bring?

Our journey as disciples is one that will continue long after our Lenten journey is done. There will undoubtedly be times when we face challenges - icebergs that come our way; stepping out into unknown places; following unmarked paths and encountering new terrain. But - it is an adventure, in faith, with the one who is Lord

of all creation and yet nearer to us than breathing. Calling us ever out of our comfort zones – out with him on the adventure that he has set before us – ever moving forward to the destination that he has promised.

I would like to pay tribute to Jim Williams as he retires from being Reader in our Benefice.

At Beaworthy we have benefited greatly from Jim's ministry. Especially so since Rev.Jane Lucas retired, but also during the whole period that he has served in Beaworthy (11 years). As a tiny rural Church we have struggled with a small congregation of committed worshippers. However, having a licensed Lay Readers has hugely benefited us. Jim's dedication, commitment, faith and abiding loyalty has marked out his ministry to us as well as his humility and kindness.

Jim is a "people" person who has made good relationships with those living in the area and the Benefice as a whole. He is ably and well supported by Pam, who has also contributed in many ways, such as Parish Secretary, sending out the Pew Sheet and Bulletin, serving on the P.C.C etc.

I recall how welcome Richard and I felt when we moved here 6 years ago as Jim and Pam remembered us from our first viewing of the property and it's environs, to our second visit and then moving in and becoming part of the church community and neighbourhood. They introduced us to everyone and have been so helpful and supportive. They have become good friends as well as good neighbours. Their special ministry and commitment to the Parish and Benefice have been so appreciated.

We wish them all the best in the future months as they consider their next steps.

Jim and Pam's arrival in Beaworthy was nothing less than a godsend. Two new neighbours from Guernsey, active churchgoers, and Jim a seasoned lay reader, planning and hoping to be licensed in the Church of England. Warm and lovely people too. Riches indeed!

We recall that as Jim and Pam arrived, Beaworthy was on its knees, struggling with low attendance and lack of leadership. Their addition to our small congregation gave us some hope that we could grow and even invigorate our church community. It was impossible not to become very fond of them both. Even on a first meeting with Jim you knew that you had met someone who was bound to become a real friend. Pam too.

Jim has given us spiritual strength. He is a good man of considerable talents. Both as an individual and a lay reader he has exemplified (and still does) Christian values for real, reaching out to neighbours and the wider parish. Whenever he's around, his sense of warmth and support is palpable and he manages not to lose his calm demeanour, even when under great strain. At PCC meetings, his common sense and profound faith have helped resolve difficult issues, for which fellow members are extremely grateful. His dry sense of humour helps too.

Importantly for us, he's managed to sustained his

commitment to Beaworthy throughout the last eleven years whilst faithfully fulfilling his duties to Ashwater, Halwill, Clawton and Tetcott and, latterly to the enlarged benefice. He's managed to undertake a range of services throughout these churches and still support St Alban's. Thankfully he has ensured that St Alban's has retained a Book of Common Prayer 1662 Evensong amongst other services. Although, sparsely attended his introduction of Morning Prayer on the first Friday of each month provided an opportunity to reflect quietly on plans for a few weeks ahead. Likewise, his introduction of a Service of Light at the boundary of October and November has enabled both remembrance of friends and relatives and a rededication to the Christian Faith

Jim's lay readership has been all about faithful service, responsibility, and example. He obviously takes considerable care in preparing for services. His sermons reflect deep thinking, reading, and his Christian experience. They have always left us thinking, provided insight, and reinforced the messages of scripture following his careful reflection. As Jane Wonnacott remarked recently "I've loved his sermons and his lovely calm voice". And so say all of us!

We fully understand his retirement decision but will miss him tremendously. Pam, of course too. Her contributions to St Alban's as PCC secretary and her major part in our fund -raising events will leave a large hole in church life. Heartfelt thanks to you both. You've been a great team.




