





Jemima Mary NILES 6th June 1860 – 6th February 1910

This month's grave is in the graveyard at St Peter Ad Vincula at Ashwater and – spoiler alert – it's a bit of an Ashwater graves two-for-one.



It caught my eye, firstly as the only "NILES" grave in Ashwater (which made me think 'how did she come to be here?' and secondly the somewhat striking inscription:

IN AFFECTIONATE REMEMBRANCE OF JEMIMA MARY NILES OF HIGHER LARKWORTHY IN THIS PARISH WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE FEBRUARY 6TH 1910 AGED 48 YEARS.

DEATH TO ME SHORT WARNING GAVE THEREFORE BE CAREFUL HOW YOU LIVE

So, naturally, I wanted to find out more about her!

Jemima NILES was born to William NILES and Ann GILLARD on June 6th 1860 at Treclero in the parish of Advent, near Camelford, Cornwall. Her parents had married in 1847, some 13 years before her birth but she was their

only child.

Her father William was from Blisland on Bodmin Moor, and he was baptised 11th June 1809, the son of George NILES and Catherine (nee JEWELL).

Jemima spent most of her life in the parish of Advent. She was baptised at St. Adwenna's church, Advent on 30th September 1860, the same church as her mother was baptised in.

Her mother Ann GILLARD was a native of Advent parish. Baptised in 1816, Ann was one of several children of George and Mary GILLARD (nee PETHICK).

In the 1871 Census, Jemima NILES is listed as a 10-year-old scholar, living at Advent, Cornwall.

She is living with her father William, aged 60 who is a farmer and miller, her mother Ann (55) and their miller/servant Thomas Harris, (19) from Tintagel.

The 1881 census is much the same – they are living at Advent. Jemima is listed as 'farmers daughter' alongside her father as a farmer of 15 acres, and Ann, her mother. By this time, the do not have a servant.

On 1st October 1883, William Niles dies and is buried at St. Adwenna. So by the 1891 census, 30 year old Jemima is living with her widowed 74 year old mother at Tresinney, the hamlet near Advent. Her uncle William GILLARD (aged 70) is also living with them, perhaps due to his ill health, or to help financially.

William GILLARD dies 13th July 1894 and is buried at St. Adwenna, so by the time of the 1901 census, it is just Jemima and her 84 year old mother, who is listed as "living on her own means." In this census, instead of being referred to as "Jemima", she is going by her middle name, Mary. They are also living at Lanteglos by Camelford. This is about the same distance from Camelford as Tresinney, but – in modern day standards – the other side of the A39. This is the last census we find either of the women in. Ann NILES dies just over seven months later on 8th November 1901 and is buried alongside her husband and family at St. Adwenna.

At some time between 1901 and 1910 we know Jemima moves to Higher Larkworthy in Ashwater and is buried at St Peter's. Jemima's death certificate reveals that she had a brain tumour and paralysis of her right side for three months prior to her death – a very short illness indeed.

Her death was registered by Thomas STEPHENS, who also lived at Higher Larkworthy. Stranger still, Thomas and his wife Elizabeth were named as executors or beneficiaries in Jemima's will. So, who were Elizabeth and Thomas to Jemima?

Jemima was an only child who never married and spent all except the last eight years of her life living with her mother. What made her move from Advent where she had extended family and very deep roots to Ashwater?

Elizabeth STEPHENS (nee HAYNE) 1849 – 19th November 1915



Above is a photo of Elizabeth (and her husband Thomas) STEPHENS' grave at St Peter ad Vincula, Ashwater.

Elizabeth HAYNE was born in 1848 at Davidstow, Cornwall where she lived until sometime between 1901 and 1911. She married her husband Thomas STEPHENS of Tregonetha, St Wenn, Cornwall at Davidstow on 27th August 1885.

Elizabeth was the daughter of Gerrance HAYNE (born 1812 at Egloskerry)

And his wife Betsy GILLARD of Advent. Betsy was the younger sister of Jemima's mother Ann; the child in between Ann and William who were living together in 1891.

Therefore, Elizabeth STEPHENS is the older cousin of Jemima NILES.

Thomas STEPHENS, however, was Elizabeth's second marriage. Previously, she was married to William HAM, who was born at St. Breward, Cornwall. They married in on 20th October 1864 at Davidstow and had seven children; Lionel Hayne (1865), William Gerrance (1865), Mary Elizabeth (1869), Kate Ellen (1870), Laura Annie (1872), Philip (1874) and Emily Grace (1876). When they lived at Davidstow, he was a farmer of 80 Acres and an Innkeeper. Her children of this marriage were Lionel HAM 1865, Laura Annie HAM 1872, Philip HAM 1874 and Emily Grace HAM 1876.

William died on the 29th October 1882, aged 42, and he is buried at Davidstow. She married Thomas three years later.

We will look a little more at Elizabeth's life as part of the STEPHENS family a little later, but we will focus on her life at Ashwater the year after her cousin's death first.

One cannot be sure of how exactly Jemima came to be in the STEPHENS household but the 1911 census can provide a potential insight.

In 1911, at Higher Larkworthy, Ashwater, Thomas STEPHENS (52) is living with his wife Elizabeth (62). Thomas is listed as a farmer.

They are living alongside their son Frederick (23) and Vernon (21) (a further son, Frank was born in 1893 but died a year later).


Alongside them are Georgina STEPHENS, an 18-year-old niece whose occupation is "Dairy work", and two nephews – Frank and William JENKIN (aged 27 and 17) who are listed as carpenters.

It seems the STEPHENS family took in other family members, and going by the stone they gave Jemima, regarded their family very highly too.

Elizabeth died only a few short years after her cousin, on 19th November

1915 at Higher Larkworthy. Her cause of death was stomach cancer (8 months) – another relatively short illness.

Elizabeth was buried at Ashwater, and her parents lie in the graveyard at the church of St. David, Davidstow.

Thomas Brenton STEPHENS 1858 – 23 June 1938

Elizabeth's husband Thomas was born in the Cornish village of Tregonetha in the parish of St. Wenn.

He was the second (and youngest) son of William STEPHENS and Mary BRENTON, both natives of St. Wenn, and the fourth of their eight children.

In the 1881 census he is living at Treneglos (roughly between Launceston and Davidstow) as a carpenter's apprentice – presumably to his brother-inlaw George JENKIN who he is living in the household of. George married Thomas's older sister Sarah. Sarah and George JENKIN are the parents of Frank and William who Thomas and his wife would go on to take in by the time of the 1911 census.

In 1885, he marries Elizabeth HAM (previously HAYNE) and they are next seen in the 1891 census living at Davidstow with their sons Vernon and Thomas STEPHENS, and three children from Elizabeth's first marriage; Laura, Philip and Emily. At the time of the 1901 census, they are still at Davidstow with Thomas and William, but only Emily remains with them. By 1911, all of the children from Elizabeth's first marriage have gone their own way.

According to Thomas's obituary in the West Briton and Cornwall Advertiser (Thursday 21st July 1938), the STEPHENS family arrived at Larkworthy in about 1905 and from this time to 1912 he was a sidesperson at the church. From 1912 until his death, he held the position of "nominated rector's warden" or churchwarden, and was such a churchgoing man that he was at the service on the Sunday before his death.

The newspaper goes on to state how his death was a loss not just to the Church but to the community, as he was chairman of the Ashwater branch of the Conservative and Unionist Association, chairman of the Market Committee, was a keen follower of the South Tetcott Hounds and served a term on Holsworthy Urban District Council.

Such was the loss to the community that a week after his funeral, a memorial service was held the following Sunday where the organist (Mr. L MAY) played the "Dead March" and muffled peals were rung.

In the list of mourners are many cousins and sisters, but Mrs. Emily WICKETT and Mrs. Laura KNEEBONE are listed as daughters in attendance. Step-children who became full daughters to him.

His bearers were Richard MOON, Robert CLIFTON, John BURNETT, Richard SPRY, William COLE and John HART – all six of these men are now interred at St. Peter's, Ashwater, too.

One cannot be sure exactly how or why the STEPHENS or NILES family came to reside this side of the Tamar, but the love and respect of their family can be seen once again, over one hundred years after the cousins passed.



Senior Clergy Reflection from Rev'd Claire Reynolds, Curate in Brixham Mission Community and Diocesan Advisor for Disabilities and Additional Needs

February is the month when it's all about love!

The shops will be full of cards for Valentines Day - we get to celebrate, thank, and declare our love to someone we know. There'll be boxes of chocolates and bunches of flowers, 'date nights' and meals out. However, St Valentine's story isn't about romantic love. A Saint in the 3rd century, Valentine's story comes to prominence when, under house arrest of Judge Asterius he prays for healing for the Judge's daughter. She is healed, and the Judge, his family and 44 members of his household are baptised. Then under Claudius II he is again arrested for preaching the Gospel and martyred in 269AD.

It's only an anecdote of a letter written to Judge Asterius' daughter shortly before his death, that gives his story any link with romantic love. Far more prominent in his story is his love of the good news that Jesus had come to seek and save the lost. God expresses his unconditional love for us through the life death and resurrection of Jesus. Valentine's commitment was to tell of this sacrificial '*agape*' love of God as far and as wide as he could, no matter the cost.

1 Corinthians 13 is all about love. The word for love used here is also 'agape' (in the original Greek). It's an active love, not just a feeling. The passage reminds us that without this love, life loses its meaning and shine; we become simply a resounding gong or clanging cymbal. This love is our response to God's saving work in Jesus. 'Agape' love is expressed in our lives through loving God and loving our neighbours as ourselves.

The life of St Valentine challenges us that a life of love is the way of the cross. But his impact on Judge Asterius and his family encourages us that a life of love means that others can come to know God's love for them. "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." (John 15:13)

Many people haven't yet heard of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and of God's love for them. Where are we, as churches and as individuals, being called to express God's love today?
